India has the largest population of stray dogs in the world, and this became a further issue when nearly the entire population of vultures in the country died off. Dogs became prominent scavengers but weren't as well equipped for that role as vultures, so health and disease became an issue.

However, Bhuria was a charismatic, healthy, and fearless wanderer of the area and would accompany me during my walks into the nearby scrub desert. While camels, leopards, and hawks were iconic species of the region, stray dogs have also become a part of the ecosystem there and deserved representation in this case.

The "rays" represent pulsating energy, the life force that holds the two sides in their orbit and infinitely expands outward. 
